
English


<u>Reading</u>

(planned from the National Curriculum 2014)

- Reading a range of fiction and non-fiction out loud, as part of a group and individually in a variety of situations for different purposes (poetry, plays, historical and geographical information, story books).
- Reading workshops including reading to an adult, shared reading, group reading, research from non-fiction, independent reading and listening to audio books.
- Whole class daily read: class teacher reads aloud to the class daily.
 This provides opportunities for all children to access a range of texts and allows for questioning and rich discussions around audience, purpose and vocabulary.
- Locating information about Europe in non-fiction texts, using contents, index, headings, sub-headings etc. Identifying key words or phrases in information passages and making independent notes.
- Locating the world's countries, using maps in an atlas, to focus on Europe, concentrating on their environmental regions, key physical and human characteristics, countries and major cities.







Writing

English



(planned from the National Curriculum 2014)

- All writing opportunities are designed around stimuli, including fiction/ non fiction books and videos to cover a wide genre of writing. We aim to make writing as cross curricular as possible.
- Writing process: weekly grammar introduced at the beginning of the week, leading into planning of writing, oral rehearsal opportunities and finally writing and editing.
- Regular writing focusing on: setting descriptions, dialogue, writing in role, note making and non-chronological reports. The children will be taught the appropriate layout for each style of writing.
- Weekly differentiated spellings ~ raising awareness of and practising spelling rules ~ to be reinforced at home each week.
- Planning, proof reading, self editing and occasionally publishing
- Developing ability to use grammar, focusing on the use of verbs, adjectives, tenses, sentence structure, speech, adverbs, and different ways of presenting text.
- Regular handwriting practice.

English

Speaking & Listening


- Group discussions on a variety of topics, giving opinions and reasons for their views.
- Listening with full concentration, taking turns to share ideas and showing whether they agree or disagree.
- Group presentation on information they have found about a specific European country.
- Opinion forming: thinking about art from Europe and your thoughts and feelings about it.



Mathematics

(planned from the National Curriculum 2014)

- Frequent mental maths sessions and the teaching of mental calculation strategies
- Counting in multiples of 50 and 100 from 0 1000, having a deep understanding of hundreds, tens and ones (HTO), comparing and ordering numbers to 1000, reading and writing numbers and number names to 1000, ten and one hundred more/less
- Beginning to use written methods for addition and subtraction (column method with exchanging) and multiplication (grid method)
- Revising 2, 5 and 10x tables, introducing the 3, 4, 8 and 11x tables
- Beginning to explore division as the inverse
- Estimating answers and checking using the inverse





<u>Science</u>

Forces:

- Exploring friction, push, pull and gravitational forces
- Teaching through practical investigation where possible

Magnetism:

 Investigating the use of magnets and their properties through exploration and practical enquiries


Computing

- Learning 'digital expertise' and how to use the internet safely and effectively
- Using search engines to research a European country of their choice
- Manipulating images and text to create an informational poster using various
 Microsoft programmes
- Beginning coding and debugging



Geography

- Exploring the world's continents and oceans.
- Beginning to differentiate between human and physical geography.
- Understanding how to use the contents and index of an atlas.
- Finding out how keys work in maps.
- Exploring physical features and landscape maps to know where mountain ranges and rivers are situated in Europe.
- Knowing the location of Europe and some countries in Europe and some capitals.
- Exploring the flags of European Countries.
- Researching aspects of life in European Countries, including languages and customs.
- Finding about the foods that come from specific countries in Europe











<u>P.E.</u>

- Developing core strength and creating opportunities to develop basic skills, as well as levels of fitness.
- Creating dance sequences in small groups, to develop collaborative skills
- Daily Mile for stamina and focus
- Hockey / rugby / basketball in Games: developing basic skills and using these in small game scenarios.

Art and Design

- Exploring and responding to the work of famous European artists: Paul Klee and Farah Atassi (contemporary) amongst others
- Understanding how to use sketching pencils effectively; exploring textures and shades
- Colour mixing and complementary colours
- Art appreciation: how to explain your opinions about art and listen to others
- Developing understanding of perspective through observational drawing













<u>R.E.</u>

Exploring Christianity through the retelling of the Christmas story. Religious art and its purpose and significance, focusing on how Christmas is celebrated in different European countries.

To become familiar with everyday phrases, including greetings, introducing yourself, numbers, colours, etc.
